Cybercrime is one of the fastest-growing threats worldwide. Last year, Americans reported over \$16.6 billion in losses from online fraud and scams, according to the FBI Internet Crime Report. The Latest Scams to Avoid

Job Posting Scam

Cybercriminals are targeting job-seekers with fake listings on sites like LinkedIn or ZipRecruiter. These scams often promise unusually high pay for simple roles. After you apply, a "hiring manager" quickly reaches out and asks you to click a link to confirm direct deposit or provide sensitive details like your SSN or credit card number. Once shared, your information can be stolen.

Grandparent Scam



Al-Generated Security Warnings

This scam starts with an email that looks completely ordinary— no links, no attachments, nothing suspicious. The trick happens when you use Google's Gemini AI to summarize it. The summary may show alarming warnings about your password being compromised, along with a fake support number to call. In reality, cybercriminals hid invisible text in the email that only Gemini can read. If you call the number, scammers will try to

Scammers exploit the affection and concern grandparents have for their grandchildren. Scammers pretend to be a grandchild in urgent need of financial help, taking advantage of your emotional vulnerability. They often claim there's an emergency, such as an accident or arrest, to pressure grandparents into sending money quickly.

steal your login information.

Amazon Smishing Scam

Cybercriminals are sending texts that appear to be from Amazon, claiming an item you purchased failed inspection or was recalled. The message offers a refund and asks you to click a link to claim it. However, the link leads to a fake Amazon site designed to steal your login, payment details, and personal information.
